Judging Criteria

Content (70%)

Selection of text centers around choice. Is the selection challenging? Does the introduction effectively describe the purpose, characters, and context of the selectin?

Effectiveness is your subjective judgement of how the response came across. Were multiple techniques used to create audience interest artfully and successfully?

Delivery (20%)

Physical presentation of the response carries part of the responsibility for effective communication. The speaker's appearance should reinforce her response. Body language should support points through gestures, expressions, and body positioning. The speaker makes effective use of and stays within the designated speaking area.

Voice is the sound that carries the message. It should be flexible, moving from one pitch level to another for emphasis, and should have a variety of rate and volume. A good voice can be clearly heard, and the words easily understood.

Language (10%)

Appropriateness relates to the suitability of the selection for the audience.

Correctness of language ensures that attention will be directed toward what the speaker says, not how it is said. Proper use of grammar and correct pronunciation will show that the speaker is the master of the words being used.

Judges Code of ethics

- 1. Judges will consciously avoid bias of any kind in selecting first, second and third place contestants. They will not consider any contestant's branch or division. Nor will they consider any contestant's age, race, creed, national origin, profession, or political beliefs. They will demonstrate the utmost objectivity.
- 2. Judges will not time the speeches and will not consider the possibility of under-time or overtime when judging a contestant's speech.
- 3. Judges will support by word and deed the contest rules and judging standards, refrain from public criticism of the contest and reveal scores and ranking only to officials.

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
